

Since the April edition, the new barge successfully installed the docks and poles. Thanks to Mark, Rick and others who prepared the barge for operation, and Tyler, Jeremy, Rick, Dave and others who took the time to learn the barge and develop the procedures for dock installation. We have established a few modifications that will reduce installation time and will be looking at these through the summer and before the 2019 installation.

We also were challenged by Measurements Canada and their definition of "trading" in fuel. Basically, they determined that by dispensing fuel we are trading in this commodity and as such require a temperature compensating pump. We made the decision with the cooperation of Dowler Karn to purchase and install a certified used pump. This action was approved by Measurements Canada and the "no pump" order lifted allowing us to once again pump fuel.

The 30A Electrical and all water outlets at the sea wall were restored. We removed all illegal 110v-15A plugs prior to the electrical inspection. Inspection of the repaired and replaced installations was completed and passed.

There were two properly installed 15A plugs that were left intact. As of today we are waiting final approval from the inspector and delivery of back ordered materials to install legal 110v-15A outlets for each dock. Patience please.

Unfortunately, due to personal reasons Dave Courage has decided to resign his position on the executive for the balance of the 2018 season. After discussions with four candidates Mark Newsom has accepted the Rear Commodore's posting for the balance of the season. Please support Mark in this endeavor. The first challenge will be a work party for the South Yard and storage of all trailers, blocks, cradles etcetera. Let's all do our part.

Final note, our club house HVAC unit seems to have expired. We have solicited quotes from Hugh's, Coad, and Roy Inch. So far all are in agreement that the unit is old, inefficient and it's problems would not be cost effective to repair. Replacement quotes will be presented at the next meeting.

I am sure there are many more issues to discuss and look forward to the next General Meeting July 15th.


KYC MEMBERS

Skipper's Responsibilities Before Setting Out



The skipper is responsible not only for the safety of the boat and those on board, but also for their behaviour. These responsibilities include legal requirements, appropriate environmental action, prudent steps for the skipper to take and acts of common courtesy. The skipper must ensure that all rules and regulations are observed. The skipper's boating mate should also know the rules and regulations for boating safety.

"The Criminal Code of Canada states that it is an indictable offence to endanger the life of anyone by operating an unseaworthy vessel that is registered or licensed. Before leaving the dock, the skipper should ensure the boat is seaworthy to avoid situations which could lead to an emergency. Safety equipment, both mandatory and optional, should be checked to ensure everything is in good condition and readily accessible. The bilge should be checked for water; and fuel, oil and fresh water levels should be checked. A radio check should be done, and charts covering the waters of the intended cruise should be laid out. The navigation route should be

planned. This is the first phase of navigation.

The charts should be studied in order to plan a safe route. It is very important not to forget to check the weather forecast.

The skipper should have the experience and skill for the trip that is planned. Before leaving the dock, the following checklist should be used:

- Ensure that navigation equipment, charts and publications are serviceable and up-to-date.
- Make sure you have your PCOC.
- Check for gas fumes.
- Make sure there is adequate fuel on board.
- Make sure the electrical system is operational.
- On a PWC and some boats, check that the automatic stop switch lanyard is attached.
- Check that the required safety equipment is stowed in an accessible location.

Items for crew comfort should also be checked, such as cold drinks, food, sunscreen, blankets, etc. Some boaters even carry extra hats.

Both vessel and crew should be checked with the intended use in mind. A voyage offshore requires different equipment and talents from one that will make a 10-minute trip around the bay.
